Admiral's account of Navy's efforts during First Gulf War gets a new edition

The man who led Canada's naval task group in the First Gulf War, Vice-Admiral (VAdm) (Retired) Duncan (Dusty) E. Miller, launched a new edition of his book on the actions of Canada's Navy during the conflict.

The launch party was hosted by the Canadian Naval Memorial Trust, aboard His Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) *Sackville* on September 11.

Canada's Navy in the First Gulf War, co-written with Sharon Hobson, is a first-hand account of the Canadian-led naval operation during the 1990-91 conflict. Miller commanded the Canadian task group deployed to the Persian Gulf under Operation FRICTION. At the time, the service was known as Maritime Command; it was renamed the Royal Canadian Navy in 2011.

Originally released in 1995 under the title of *The Persian Excursion*, the book covers Canada's role in the conflict from start to finish.

The new edition, published by Formac, includes an additional chapter exploring how the navy has evolved over the past 35 years.

During the launch, Miller recounted tales from the book, including the extraordinary effort required to prepare the ships for war. After Iraq invaded Kuwait in August 1990, Canada committed two warships and a supply vessel. Each of the ships required significant equipment upgrades.

"The Dockyard did two weeks' worth of putting all this new equipment aboard in what would have been an eight-month job," Miller said, even noting a final, last-minute trip to Canadian Tire for a missing part.

Once in the Gulf, Miller and the naval task group oversaw the Combat Logistics Force, made up of about sixty ships from allied nations.

Miller said the book was written to let Canadians know how well their Navy (then known as Maritime Command, now as the Royal Canadian Navy) operates when it matters most. He recalled being urged to write it by the then Chief of Defence Staff, General John de Chastelain, upon his return from the Gulf. De Chastelain told him that leading a coalition force during wartime was something Canadians hadn't done since the Second World War.

He highlighted the critical role of HMCS *Protecteur*, which refueled 70 allied ships during the war. The ship also carried 35 women, marking the first time Canada sent women into a war to serve in a front-line role.

In another story from the book, Miller described how HMCS *Athabaskan* "tip-toed" through a minefield to rescue the United States Ship (USS) *Princeton* after it struck a mine off Kuwait.

He also made mention of the support from home during the war, including free pizzas brought to the ships from a Halifax Greco Pizza location, and lobsters from Clearwater for Christmas. He noted the sailors voted to go to sea on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day because they felt safest there.

"The quality of the men and women sailors was amazing," he said.

Canada's Navy in the First Gulf War is now available for purchase. Miller will also deliver a presentation on the book at the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic on Nov. 10.

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HMCS St. John's deploys for Exercise STRIKE WARRIOR 26

His Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) *St. John's* departed Halifax on September 11 for an overseas deployment that will see the ship join NATO allies and partners for Exercise STRIKE WARRIOR 26.

The United Kingdom-led exercise will take place across the North Sea and the waters west of Scotland, including the Northwest Approaches and the Western Isles, from September 21 to October 9.

Exercise STRIKE WARRIOR is designed to prepare the UK Carrier Strike Group and participating allied forces to operate together in challenging environments. The training will test a range of capabilities in scenarios designed to reflect potential real-world threats, including evading hostile submarines, defending aircraft carriers against simulated missile attacks and navigating narrow waterways while operating under threat.

The deployment will also continue recent Royal Canadian Navy cooperation with the UK Carrier Strike Group. In

2025, HMCS *Ville de Québec* became the first RCN warship to fully integrate into a UK-led Carrier Strike Group, sailing alongside HMS *Prince of Wales* and other allied ships during the multinational Operation HIGHMAST deployment to the Indo-Pacific.

For the crew of HMCS *St. John's*, the deployment provides an opportunity to strengthen interoperability with some of Canada's closest allies while sharpening the skills required for high-tempo maritime operations.

The deployment follows a busy summer for the Halifax-based frigate. HMCS *St. John's* recently participated in International Naval Review 250 in New York City, as well as the United States-led FLEETEX 250 exercise. Earlier in the summer, the ship completed Basic Single Ship Readiness Training and Intermediate Air-Sea Readiness Training in June, helping prepare the crew for these increasingly complex operations alongside allied forces.

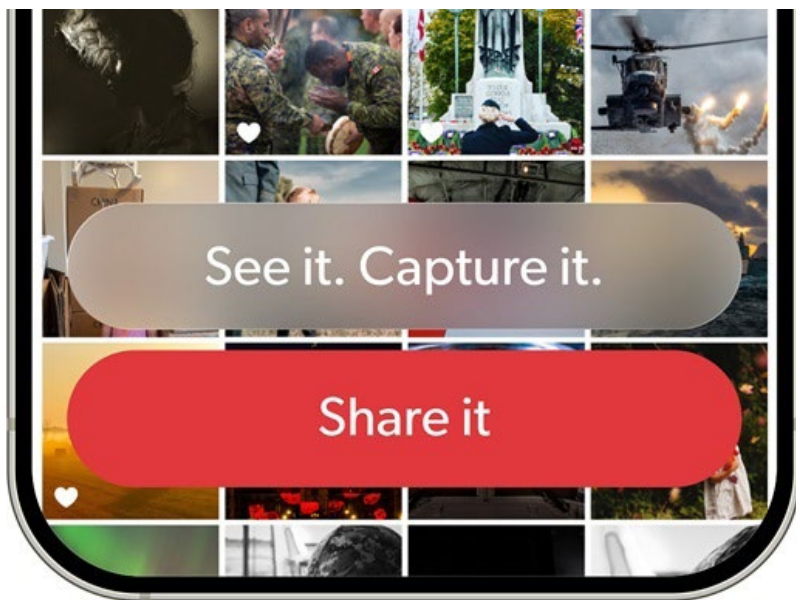

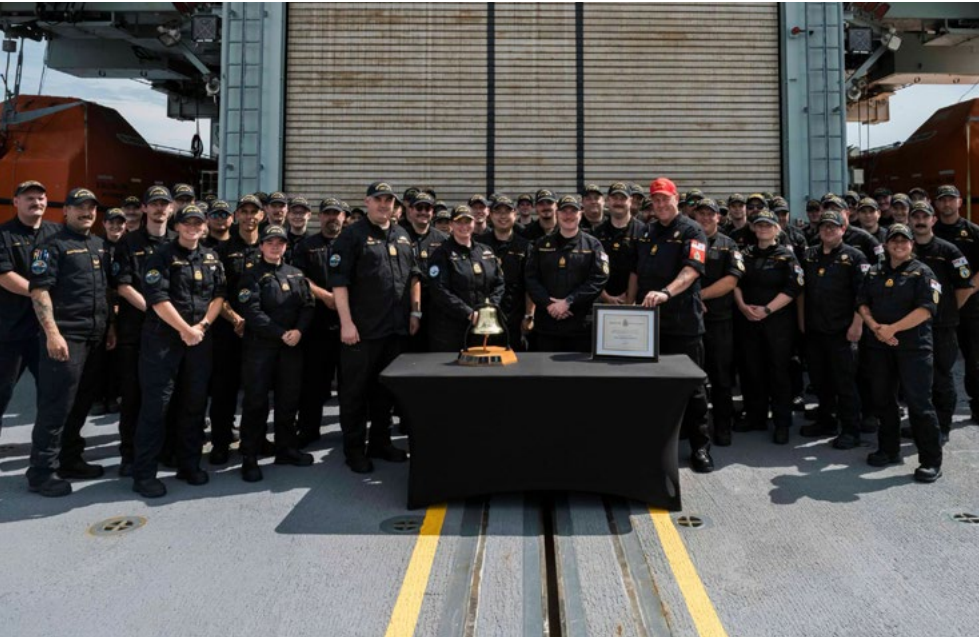

The ship's company of HMCS *Frédéric Rolette* has been recognized for its efficiency, strong morale, and leadership over the past year with one of Formation Halifax's signature annual awards. The 2026 Admiral's Bell was presented aboard the ship on August 28 by RAdm Pascal Belhumeur, Commander MARLANT and JTFA, and CPO1 Patrick Mackey, the Formation Chief. HMCS Robert Hampton Gray crew visits Franklin Expedition graves

Sailors aboard His Majesty's Canadian Ship (HMCS) *Robert Hampton Gray* had an opportunity to connect with a famous chapter of Arctic maritime history during a recent visit to Beechey Island, Nunavut.

Members of the ship's company went ashore in rotations, spending about an hour each exploring the historic sites on the island. These include the graves of three members of the 1845 Franklin Expedition and memorials connected to the generations of explorers and sailors who followed them into the Arctic.

Beechey Island was the wintering

site for Sir John Franklin and the crews of HMS *Erebus* and HMS *Terror* during the winter of 1845/46. Franklin's expedition had set out in search of the Northwest Passage, the long-sought sea route connecting the Atlantic and Pacific through the Arctic Archipelago. The ships later became trapped in ice near King William Island and were abandoned in 1848.

The disappearance prompted decades of searches that contributed significantly to the mapping and understanding of the Canadian Arctic. More recently, Inuit traditional knowledge, combined

with modern archaeological methods, played a central role in the searches that located the wrecks of *Erebus* in 2014 and *Terror* in 2016.

The visit also highlighted a connection to the Royal Canadian Navy's own history in the Arctic. Near the Franklin memorials stands a wooden monument erected by members of HMCS *Labrador*, commemorating the icebreaker's historic 1954 transit of the Northwest Passage. The pyramid-shaped structure was modelled after navigational beacons erected by *Labrador* crews during the ship's Arctic operations.

The stop came as *Robert Hampton Gray* continues its Operation NANOOK deployment and westward transit toward its new home port at CFB Esquimalt. Now roughly halfway through the voyage, the ship recently stopped outside Cambridge Bay to take on fuel and provisions before beginning the longest remaining leg of the journey.

The crew is also preparing for more challenging ice conditions ahead, adding another modern chapter to the long history of naval operations along the Northwest Passage.

The return of The Crowsnest

Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) history is carried not only through its ships and sailors, but also through the names that endure across generations. On [September 3, 2026](#), *Our Navy Today* was rebranded to *The Crowsnest*. For our sailors, the term “crow’s nest” is a callback to the lookout positioned high above a ship, scanning the horizon, reporting what lies ahead and helping connect the crew with the wider world. It is a fitting symbol for a publication that exists to inform, connect, and share the stories of our naval community. The Crowsnest has been a cornerstone of the Navy since its first publication at HMCS Cornwallis in 1942. It informed

sailors at home and overseas during the Second World War and later served as the RCN’s official magazine. Across three iterations, *The Crowsnest* has evolved from a wartime newspaper to a quarterly magazine and now a monthly digital newsletter. Bringing back *The Crowsnest* re-establishes *Our Navy Today* with a name rooted in generations of service and a longstanding tradition of highlighting the people, operations and achievements that define Canada’s Navy.
